Marijuana: The Discussion Continues (and it should!)

Marijuana is the most common illicit drug used in the United States. After a period of decline in the last decade, its use has generally increased among young people since 2007, corresponding to a diminishing perception of the drug's risks. More teenagers are now current (past-month) smokers of marijuana than of cigarettes, according to annual survey data.

There is much misinformation and a lot of emotion surrounding the use of marijuana with many individuals who smoke pot saying how completely safe and beneficial it is and scientists and many treatment professionals focusing on the consequences and negative effects.

Research has shown that the use of marijuana can produce adverse physical, mental, emotional, and behavioral effects. It can impair short-term memory and judgment and distort perception. Because marijuana affects brain systems that are still maturing through young adulthood, its use by teens may have a negative effect on their development. And contrary to popular belief, it can be addictive.


Prevention professionals are concerned about the low perception of risk among 8th-, 10th-, and 12th-graders, based on data from the Monitoring the Future national survey. In 2011, 12.5 percent of 8th-graders reported marijuana use in the past year, and 7.2 percent were current users. Among 10th-graders, 28.8 percent had used marijuana in the past year, and 17.6 percent were current users. Rates of use among 12th-graders were higher still: 36.4 percent had used marijuana during the year prior to the survey, and 22.6 percent were current users. The concern is that marijuana can make it harder to function when schoolwork is demanding or when attention and focus are required. Research has also shown that marijuana's negative effects on attention, memory, and learning can last for days or weeks after the acute effects of the drug wear off. Consequently, someone who smokes marijuana daily may be functioning at a reduced intellectual level most or all of the time. Not surprisingly, evidence suggests that, compared with their nonsmoking peers, students who smoke marijuana tend to get lower grades and are more likely to drop out of high school.

Long-term marijuana use can lead to addiction; that is, people have difficulty controlling their drug use and cannot stop even though it interferes with many aspects of their lives. It is estimated that 9 percent of people who use marijuana will become dependent on it. The number goes up to about 1 in 6 in those who start using young (in their teens) and to 25-50 percent among daily users. At a minimum, because marijuana impairs judgment and motor coordination and slows reaction time, a person under the influence of marijuana has an increased chance of being involved in and being responsible for automobile crashes.

It is safe to say that from the increasing body of scientific data available, marijuana can be harmful to the adolescent brain, specifically those who are most vulnerable from either a genetic or psychological standpoint.

Let's keep up the discussion of this and other substances being abused by youth in our communities. Join the Millstone Township Alliance to Prevent Substance Abuse as we look at these and other issues and work toward a healthier community. Our meetings are now held on the second Thursday of each month at 7:00 PM in the Municipal Court Building.

RECYCLING

Official Notice: To Residents and Businesses of Millstone Township

Recycling is mandated by the State, County and Municipal Statutes.

Millstone Township must continue to recycle to meet aggressive recycling goals set by the State and County. As the Deputy Recycling Coordinator of the Township, my responsibility is to continue to strive to meet those goals by aggressively enforcing Township ordinances. Random inspections within the Township resulted in citations being issued for lack of compliance with Chapter 19, SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT, of the Revised General Ordinances, Township of Millstone. Some brief passages from this section follow:

"It shall be mandatory for all persons, who are owners, lessees, or occupants of residential property, to separate newspapers, glass bottles and jars, tin and bi-metal cans, plastic containers, aluminum cans, corrugated cardboard and electronics as hereafter defined from all other solid waste produced by such residence for collection and ultimate recycling of materials.

Solid waste: Solid waste shall mean and include all garbage and rubbish normally produced by the occupants of commercial, industrial and residential property and disposed of by private or public pick-up.

Proof of collection service: Proof of collection service shall mean a written record, log, bill or document evidencing receipt of service for the collection of solid waste for the preceding month from a person lawfully engaging in private solid waste collection services within the Township.

Violations and penalties: Any person, firm or corporation who violates or neglects to comply with any provision of this section or any rule or regulation promulgated pursuant thereto, shall be liable to the penalty stated in Chapter I, Section 1-5. (Fines could be as much as \$2,000.00 for non-compliance).

Note: **Court appearance may be required for summons.**

I urge you to continue to do your part in keeping Millstone Township clean and to show that we are an "Environmentally Concerned Community".


Mandated Recyclables



BOTTLES & CANS

Aluminum Cans. DO NOT INCLUDE; FOIL, PIE TINS, TRAYS, COOKWARE
Tin & Bi-Metal Cans
Glass Bottles & Jars. DO NOT INCLUDE; DISHWARE, LIGHT BULBS, CERAMICS, WINDOW GLASS

Plastic "Pourable Containers". Neck of bottle smaller than body, #1 #2
Be careful to completely empty any container used for automotive fluids. Any leftover chemicals in containers can be disposed (call 732-683-8686 for appointment) at the Household Hazardous Waste Facility



NEWSPAPERS

Newspapers and any inserts that come with the paper.
DO NOT INCLUDE ANY NEWSPAPER USED FOR PET WASTE OR HOUSEHOLD PROJECTS



CORRUGATED CARDBOARD

Waffle section between layers. DO NOT INCLUDE: FOOD CONTAMINATED CARDBOARD (e.g. pizza boxes) OR WAXED CARDBOARD. Break down boxes.



MIXED PAPER

Includes: letterhead, colored and white paper, junk mail, soft cover books, chip-board (e.g. cereal boxes). DO NOT INCLUDE: FOOD WRAPPERS, PAPER CUPS OR PLATES OR ANY OTHER PRODUCT USED FOR FOOD OR PERSONAL HYGIENE. NO HARDCOVER BOOKS (UNLESS COVER & BINDER IS REMOVED)



LEAVES AND GRASS CLIPPINGS

DO NOT DISPOSE WITH HOUSEHOLD TRASH. Most towns collect unbagged leaves in the fall and spring. Grass clippings can be left on the lawn, added to compost piles, or brought to special drop-off at county landfill (for a fee)



CAR BATTERIES & MOTOR OIL-RECHARGEABLE & BUTTON BATTERIES

Car batteries can be brought to a scrap yard. Motor oil can be brought to the County HHW facility, many municipal recycling depots, or local service stations. Most common household batteries (A, AA, AAA, C, D, 9 Volt) can be disposed in regular trash. However, rechargeable batteries should be brought to retail store drop offs (check www.rbrcf for locations), and silver "button batteries" should be returned to retail or county sponsored drop offs



We Can Prevent Stroke

Stroke is among the five leading causes of death for Americans. According to the World Stroke Organization, 1 out of 6 people worldwide will have a stroke during their lifetime.

One of the best ways to help save lives from stroke is to know what a stroke looks like. Learning about stroke can help you act fast to save a co-worker, friend or relative. Although stroke risk increases with age, strokes can-and do-occur at any age.

The five most common signs and symptoms of stroke are:

- Sudden numbness or weakness in the face, arm, or leg, especially on one side of the body.
- Sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes.
- Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance, or lack of coordination.
- Sudden severe headache with no known cause.



If you or someone else experiences one or more signs of stroke, call 9-1-1 right away.

Every minute counts! Stroke patients who arrive at the emergency room within 3 hours of their first symptoms are usually healthier 3 months after a stroke than people who receive delayed care.

If you have any medical conditions that increase your risk for stroke, such as high cholesterol, high blood pressure, or heart disease, there are steps you can take to lower your risk.

Make sure you and your family members have a physical or checkup every year, including checking cholesterol levels, monitoring blood pressure, and managing Diabetes. (Under the Affordable Care Act certain preventable health screenings are covered at no charge to you).

Follow your healthcare team's instructions carefully when taking medications to treat your medical conditions. Ask questions if you do not understand something.

Practice Healthy Living Habits to Prevent Stroke

Healthy eating. Both sodium and alcohol can raise your blood pressure if you have too much of them each day. Smoking cigarettes also raises your blood pressure. Eating foods high in cholesterol can build up fatty deposits, called plaque, on the walls of your blood vessels. These deposits can block the flow of blood to the brain, causing a stroke.

To help prevent stroke, prepare meals with lots of fresh fruits and vegetables, and limit the amount of saturated fat, trans fat, sodium, and cholesterol in your meals. To help keep blood pressure in a healthy range, help family members avoid (or stop) smoking, and limit alcohol use to no more than one drink per day for women or two drinks per day for men.

Physical activity. Being overweight or obese can raise total cholesterol levels, increase blood pressure, and lead to diabetes. But being physically active will help you and your family members maintain a healthy weight and keep blood pressure and cholesterol in a healthy range.

The Surgeon General recommends adults engage in moderate-intensity physical activity for 2 hours and 30 minutes every week.
